Dear Mother:-

I want to say further that if in any word, any where I have done anything to injure your influence, I am certainly very sorry for it. But, Mother, I want you to realize that there have been those like Saddler who have done their best to pump me and get me to say things in regard to you and your word and then they have made a handle of what I have said and magnified it in a wonderful degree. I had forgotten that I had met Saddler at Berrien Springs at all, but I want to say to you that the statements that you made to me while I was there was a perfect astonishment to me. I never said such things as you say and if you were told so, the parties who said it were mistaken. I have tried to guard your influence to the best of my ability.
