Dear Brother:-

I enclose in this a letter just received from Walter Harper; it speaks for itself. I also enclose a copy of my answer to him; and this speaks for itself. ^{Will you see if you can do anything about it?} One of our missionaries in Cuba begged of me to get him a thousand copies of this book in Spanish. The Review and Herald would not print it; they would not allow me to have the plates to print it, and just simply held back the whole proposition. If they are to occupy the place of an **obstruction office** I am sorry. I am tired of this kind of business and hope that such things as this will be rare in the future. If you can tell me where the plates of this book are I will be very glad. Further, if you can inform me what they intend to do about it I shall be much better pleased.

I am certainly sorry that it has been impossible for me to maintain the ownership of my books in all languages. I know our people would be much better served than they have been if this had been the case; but circumstances have been the arbiter of my destiny so far as this is concerned, and I shall trouble myself about it as little as possible. I hope my letter in regard to foreign books reached you and that its statements may be satisfactory to you.

I shall be glad to hear from you in regard to it to say the least.
