We have been to the polls and have cast our votes in favor of the prohibition amendment. It is probable that the voting this year will be very heavy, as there is much feeling and many interests involved, and all want to have a say as to what measures should be passed upon. We hope and pray for the best.

I had a visit with your Mother yesterday, but was unable to read her a chapter. I will try to read some to-day if she is strong enough. She is keeping up better than we dared hope a few weeks ago; and she seems happy and content.

I am not writing you at length to-day, as there is very little to say in addition to what has been written in days now passed by. Every one is as well as usual. We are having lovely weather. Have had some rains---seasonable.

By the time you receive this, you will be closing up your work in Washington, ready for the return trip. We are praying that you may be prospered in all that you have in mind to accomplish, and that you may take care of your health, so as to return with strength and courage. We shall be very glad to have you close by once more.

Sorry you missed your chance to vote. Doubtless you will get the election returns for California as early as even earlier than we, as you are in close touch with one of the world's news centers, and we are in the country. I doubt whether prohibition amendment will carry. I think the State will go for this time, and that the measure next time will have to be on the abolition of the saloon.
